ING A FUTURE FOR MI'S YOUTH

n the afternoon of May 23, 2017, a few days before Ramadan, armed fighting broke out between government forces and militants in the Islamic city of Marawi. The clash initiated a five-month long siege and forced thousands of civilians to leave their homes and livelihoods behind as they fled from the battle. An estimated 200,000 individuals were displaced at the height of the crisis.

Government forces prevailed in the end and in the aftermath the city has progressed steadily towards rehabilitation and recovery. While there are existing efforts at multi-sectoral rehabilitation, roadblocks still deter Marawi's progress. In particular, the lack of appropriate construction skills and technical qualifications prevent job-seeking youth from securing decent livelihoods and, consequently, uplifting their economic capacity.

Access to an inclusive and marketdriven Vocational Educational and Training (TVET) ecosystem to produce an up-skilled and right-skilled young workforce is critical for Marawi's recovery. To deliver such, the Future Movers Programme was rolled out last 18th February. The project will be implemented through a private-public partnership among ASSIST, the Colombo Plan Staff College (CPSC), the German-Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry (GPCCI), and TÜV Rheinland, and with generous support from the Belgian organization, ENABEL.

"A city that needs to rebuild, means, first, we need to rebuild the capacity of the people. That's the role of TVET," said Dr. Ramhari Lamichhan, Director of CPSC. The programme is based on innovative learning approaches, global and standardized skills certification, and comprehensive labour market integration. The project envisions socially and economically empowering the youth in post-conflict Marawi by increasing their employability through an innovative VET Ecosystem. The project will benefit more than 500 internally displaced persons in Misamis Oriental, Lanao del Norte, and Lanao del Sur.

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Master of Disaster M Spotlight

Master of Disaster is one of ASSIST's original social initiatives that was first conceptualized in 2013. It has since undergone many changes, faced many challenges, and continues to overcome the test of time. As the lasting consequences of being unprepared and unequipped to face disasters become more apparent, Master of Disaster has become a key, innovative resource to build resilient homes, businesses, and communities in the Philippines and India.

COMMUNITIES COMING TOGETHER FOR RESILIENCE

ach country faces its own challenges in crafting solutions that can address disasters and their consequences.
India and the Philippines are both immensely disaster-prone and the ASSIST team has long been looking for ways to bring Master of Disaster and the best practices gained from its successes in the Philippines to India.

ASSIST was supported by Wishberry, the number one crowdfunding platform in India, in the creation of a crowdfunding campaign to foster a safer and more resilient India. From February 8 to March 16, 2020, ASSIST campaigned to get support from communities and individuals that could support Master of Disaster: Conducting test runs in schools and organizing focus group discussions with disaster management experts to localize the game.





Thanks to the 121 people that backed the campaign, ASSIST was able to raise ₹4,00,700, funds which will be dedicated to translation, prototyping, organizing focus group discussions and test runs, project management, and expert support.

MOD is the first of its kind in India. It is a great medium of learning through play - it promotes responsibility, teamwork apart from educating kids and youth on disaster preparedness. It is a good way to mobilize volunteers to build disaster preparedness in India among the private and public sectors, the academe, and more.



THE BOARD ROOM CAFE GAME NIGHT

n the 28th of February 2020, ASSIST, in association with the Board Room Cafe, organized a gaming event, "Master of Disaster" to help raise awareness on disaster resilience and preparedness. More than 30 people, including professional gamers, young professionals from the startup world, college students, kids, teachers, NGO and corporate professionals, played the board game, "Master of Disaster."

The event was organized to discuss and promote the game in the

context of disaster resilience in the Indian context. India ranks 5th in the Global Climate Risk Index, and awareness on what to do in case of a disaster is extremely low. Now, ASSIST is bringing the game to India, with modifications suited to the local disaster context. This toolkit takes the form of a game that children in schools can play, to imbibe and understand the basics of disaster response and preparedness.



MOD AT WORK

eventy employees of Wells Fargo participated in a training of trainers event for Master of Disaster on March 29, 2020. The company has been providing support to the City of Taguig, particularly in the area of disaster resiliency, and the Master of Disaster is a tool to complement that advocacy. After the training of trainers, Wells Fargo employees were equipped to share their learnings with their fellow colleagues and engage beneficiary schools and communities as Masters of Disaster.

Raising Vietnam's Agrarian Inclustry

rietnam's agriculture sector is one of the burgeoning industries in the country. A testament to this is its contribution to the country's economic growth—accounting for 15.34 percent of total GDP last 2017. However, the sector

is still scarred with issues such

as the increasing demand from

vietnam's agriculture consumers for safer food and sector is one of quality management systems.

In line with empowering the farmers and consumers, a Global GAP certification audit was conducted under the CoopEnable project at Truong Khuong Agricultural Cooperatives (AC) in Can Tho and Tan Thuan Tay AC in Dong Thap, where ASSIST met with the Department of Agricultural and Rural Development of Dong Thap to strengthen partnerships with local authorities. Non-compliance points were brought up during the audit, with corrective actions expected to be completed by April.

CoopEnable (Enabling, Building Cooperative Capacity) is a project implemented by ASSIST Vietnam, co-financed by KfW DEG and SGS Vietnam which aims to address the needs of both the farmers and the consumers by strengthening the farmers' competitiveness through an effective model for cooperative development.





Harvest Festival: Celebrating Market-Ready Farms



he main challenge for modernizing Philippine agriculture and the vegetable industry is to transform smallholder subsistence farming into one that is market-focused and commercial. However, onion production is severely limited by losses caused by natural calamities and infestation impacts.

The Onion UNION Project introduces the use of Integrated Pest Management (IPM), drip irrigation system, and other technologies to capacitate and build the resilience of onion farmers in the country.

Over the course of the project, multiple learning sessions on these subjects were delivered to local farmers. On

nge for March 4, 2020, in the Onion Learning Center of Bayambang, Pangasinan, a harvest festival was organized to highlight harvest activities including the installation and testing of the iMETOS 3.3 Automatic Weather Station. SOLution: Shining Light on Farmers Productivity





OLution (Solarpowered Irrigation System for Farming Communities) project is a Public-Private Partnership under the DeveloPPP program German Federal of the Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, implemented through DEG in partnership with Grundfos Philippines Pumps and Asia Society for Social Improvement and Sustainable Transformation (ASSIST). The project aims to increase agricultural productivity of 100 farmers in Norzagaray, Bulacan by installing solarpowered irrigation systems.

Last March 9-10, a two-day theoretical and on the job training was conducted in the province of Norzagaray, which Bulacan trained local irrigation specialists, technicians, agronomists, agriengineers, and instructors on operation and maintenance and pumps solar power irrigation systems.



Connecting to Virtual Learning



bout 10 to 15% of the global markets account to Business Process (BPO) Outsourcing alone. This industry currently thriving is among developing countries in Asia like Viet Nam, ranking fifth of the twenty emerging markets with the highest potential for BPO growth.

BPOs do not only provide a wide array of solutions for cost reduction and business growth, but also open various employment opportunities for people with basic skills. However, the

skills demanded by BPOs are not often harnessed by marginalized groups such as persons with disabilities (PWDs), stay-at-home women, and youth in rural areas. To bridge this gap, ASSIST, in partnership with DIGI-TEXX, a digital services provider in Viet Nam, the Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs (MOLISA) and select partner BPO companies, will establish an e-learning platform that will enable remote training for marginalized groups through this project called DIGI-CONNECT. With the help of local vocational schools and training institutions,

training modules focused on data processing skills shall be developed. Internet cafes are also tapped to provide access to target beneficiaries who lack equipment to pursue training.

It is estimated that this initiative will reach 10,000 people in rural Viet Nam. By the end of the project around 2,000 trained individuals will be employed by DIGI-TEXX and partner companies, and will be working from their homes instead of travelling to BPO offices located in the cities.

As digitalization takes over traditional learning methods, initiatives like DIGI-CONNECT promote inclusive learning by providing access to opportunities for the underserved sectors.

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Creating Future-Ready Graduates

ecoming future-ready is an important skill that students must learn before they graduate. The challenge is to familiarize students with the ins and outs of the professional world and equip them with the right skillset to take on corporate challenges.

ASSIST partnered with Deloitte Consulting PDC to solve issues the global that challenge economy through education and skills development with its Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) WorldClass. program,

"We are committed to applying our core skills and experience to empower Filipinos through the academe we only focus on WorldClass" said Uday Sreeram, Managing Director of Deloitte Consulting PDC. One of the key projects under this program is the Training of Trainers (TOT) in the Philippines. Educators from the Polytechnic University of the Philippines (PUP) were trained on agile methodology, a project management mindset that is based on iterative and incremental development, where requirements and solutions evolve through collaboration between self-organizing, cross-functional teams.

PUP Taguig Branch Director, Dr. Marissa Ferrer, said, "Inside concepts and theories. There is a mismatch between the academe and industry practices. Through this partnership with Deloitte, we can easily address the problem because they bring actual practices and systems, which we can easily incorporate in how we teach our students."

The agile training was held on February 20. An initial 20 educators participated in the training, but plans for expansion to other branches of PUP are underway.





A Solid Solution to Solid Waste

I he shift to sustainability has increased the global demand for a solid waste m a n a g e m e n t

imperative—recycling. In Vietnam, this has been a longstanding priority, alongside the goal of establishing a circular economy, for its positive environmental impacts. In fact, there is a current swing of recycled polyethylene terephthalate (rPET) especially in

Ho Chi Minh City, as industries are now finding the balance between economic realities and environmental regulations.

Because of the success of some rPET processing and recycling schemes, ASSIST launched the Post-Consumer Resin (PCR) Market Development project, which is aimed at developing the market for localized PCR industry in Vietnam by bridging the demand and supply within 15 months.



partnership with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources in Tam Binh District, Vinh Long Province, a call for local partner companies to utilize PCRs as fundamental raw materials in their operations shall be embarked and these raw materials will come from an investment-ready, food-grade rPET resin factory. This initiative is a head start to bring the New Plastics Economy (NPE) to the region covered and provides a replicable scheme that will encourage investment for modern PCR recycling factories.

This PCR Market Development Project will demonstrate the key roleofmulti-sectoral partnerships in driving improvements to solid waste management efforts without having to compromise the economic needs of a continuously growing manufacturing base and the environment.

Building Smart Windows to the Future

hirty youth were trained as product technicians and window installation apprentices under the "Smart Window Technology Adaptation for Responsible Living" or SMART-Li, a project of ASSIST India in partnership with Lingel Windows and Doors Technologies Private Limited last January of this year.

Launched last August 9th of 2019, the SMART-LI project seeks to mitigate air pollution through innovative ventilation solutions in residential homes and medical establishments in India. The second batch of training was held in Bhiwadi, Rajasthan state and covered several practical topics on welding, cutting and even electrical safety in compliance to the course curriculum developed by Lingel.

After the completion, successful trainees received a certificate where few of them got officially absorbed by Lingel, with the rest being placed on window manufacturer companies. As part of the ongoing product installation and monitoring of air quality, SMART-LI chips were also installed in 12 homes and 2 hospitals last February 9th.

Saving the Slums: UN Habitat's PSUP

n estimated 828 million people live in slums, representing around one third of the world's urban population according to the World Health Organization. Slum dwellers are often exposed to tight living spaces and unsanitary practices, making them at risk for various communicable diseases.

UN Habitat's Participatory Slum Upgrading Programme (PSUP) aims to improve the lives of slum dwellers by strengthening global partnerships and policy dialogue for participatory slum upgrading and prevention in 79 African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries. UN Habitat partnered with ASSIST Creativelab to support the engagement of PSUP with the private sector, contribute to the identification of concrete entry points and models for private sector engagement to slum upgrading and private sector partnerships for the PSUP. Under the partnership, ACL will also engage the organization through a private sector partnership forum and facilitate key discussions between selected private sector and government champions.



Chemonics' HRH2030: Leaving No One Behind



accinations continue to play an essential role in eradicating and managing infectious, yet preventable diseases such as polio. The success of these vaccinations, however, doesn't only rely on its sheer benefit, but also from the public trust.

The Department of Health partnered with ASSIST Creativelab to boost public trust on immunization and vaccination programs, by strengthening health workers' interpersonal communication (IPC) skills and preparing them on how to properly respond to various immunization concerns. Last February 21, the last pilot test for the Health Worker's Toolkit for Interpersonal Communication on Immunization was conducted at the San Jose Del Monte Bulacan City Hall, where health workers learned some tips on how to communicate vaccination benefits and overcome objections related to vaccine hesitancy.





SSIST Creativelab developed e-learning modules for the Universal Health Care and Family Planning under the HRH2030 Project implemented by international development consulting firm, Chemonics International Philippines.

The HRH2030 project is a USAID program which seeks to strengthen the health workforce to improve family planning and tuberculosis services. Under the partnership with Chemonics International Philippines,

ACL produced e-learning modules that will standardize core training courses for health workers into online modules.

Chemonics International Philippines and ACL hopes that by reinforcing the capacity of the health workforce, Filipinos will have greater access to quality healthcare and services needed to maintain a healthy population.




Who is Your Female Role Model and Why?
